BIOGRAPHIES

PRESIDENT-ELECT/PRESIDENT-ÉLU

PETER H. RUSSELL, professor of political science, University of Toronto. He has been at the University of Toronto since 1958 where he has served as the Principal of Innis College and is currently Director of Graduate Studies in the Department of Political Science. He spent two years at Makerere University in Uganda and has been a visiting fellow at Harvard University and the Australian National University. His publications include articles and books on judicial and constitutional politics, most recently The Judiciary in Canada: The Third Branch of Government. He was review editor for the Canadian Journal of Economics and Political Science. He was Director of Research for the McDonald Royal Commission on the R.C.M.P. and a member of the Task Force on Comprehensive Land Claims. He is just completing a two-year term as President of the Canadian Law and Society Association. Professor Russell is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada and an Officer of the Order of Canada.

SIMON MCINNES, Director, Policy and Constitution Branch, Self Government Sector, Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development, since August 1987. He was educated at Bishop's (B.A. 1970), McMaster (M.A. 1971), and Carleton (Ph.D. 1978). He taught at Saskatchewan (1974-75), Glendon College, York University (1975-77), and McMaster (1977-79). From 1979 to 1981 he worked as a constitutional advisor to the Inuit Committee on National Issues, working on securing the recognition of aboriginal rights in Canada's Constitution. In 1982 he joined Energy, Mines and Resources as an advisor on northern energy issues and became Chief, Federal-Provincial-Territorial Energy Relations in December 1983. From August 1985 to July 1987 he was Director, Corporate Planning and Coordination, Ministry of State for Science and Technology, Government of Canada.

Dr. McInnes has co-edited The Soviet Union and East Europe into the 80s (Mosaic Press, 1978); published articles in Canadian Public Administration, Journal of Canadian Studies, Canadian Slavonic Papers; CA Magazine; contributed articles to several edited books; given over a dozen conference papers; published many reviews, and refereed for Methuen, Prentice-Hall, Canadian Public Administration and Canadian Public Policy. He was a member of the CPSA Programme Committee for the 1978 and 1987 meetings. His current interests include Canadian public administration and public policy.

JAMES P. BICKERTON, Assistant Professor at St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, Nova Scotia, since 1984. He has received his B.A. (1976) from Acadia University, his M.A. (1980) and Ph.D. (1988) from Carleton University. He has area specializations in Canadian Politics, Regional Political Economy, and Federalism. Professor Bickerton is currently engaged in research on constituency politics in Canada, regional development policies, and politics in Atlantic Canada.

DAVID DEWITT is Director, Centre for International and Strategic Studies and Associate Professor of Political Science, York University. Dewitt previously taught at the University of Alberta and was a post-doctoral fellow at the Institute of International Relations, University of British Columbia. He attended U.B.C., University of Chicago, and Stanford University Ph.D. in 1977. He is the author, co-author, or a contributing editor of publications on international relations and foreign policy, including Canada as a Principal Power (1983, with John Kirton), Nuclear Non-Proliferation and Global Security (1987), Conflict Management in the Middle East (1987, with Gabriel Ben-Dor), East-West Arms Control: Challenges for the Western Alliance (forthcoming, with Hans Rattinger), and The Gulf War: Regional Security and Conflict Management (forthcoming, with Janice Stein).

STÉPHANE DION, Professeur adjoint au Département de science politique de l'Université de Montréal depuis 1984, Diplômes: B.A. (Laval 1977), M.A. (Laval 1979), Doctorat d'État (I.E.P. de Paris 1984). Enseignements et recherches en administration publique. A publié La politisation des mairies (Paris, Economica, 1986) et a collaboré, entre autres, à la Revue canadienne de science politique, Administration publique du Canada, Politique et la Revue française de science politique. A reçu le premier Prix international de thèses sur les collectivités locales (1984) et la médaille de la section "Science du politique" du CNRS (1985). Secrétaire à la rédaction et responsable des recensions de la Revue canadienne de science politique depuis 1987.

RAIS A. KHAN is a graduate of The University of Michigan where he obtained his Ph.D. in Political Science in 1967. He taught at the Clarion University of Pennsylvania and has been with the Political Science Department of The University of Winnipeg since 1967 where he is currently Chairman of the Department. He is also Adjunct Professor in the Department of Political Studies at the University of Manitoba. He has acted as commentator and discussant for papers at the annual CPSA meetings. He has published articles in the International Journal, the Chatham House publication The World Today and written reviews for the CJPS. He is, with James McNiven, co-author of An Introduction to Political Science, whose 4th edition is forthcoming.

PATRICK KYBA, Professor, Department of Political Studies, University of Guelph since 1967. Degrees: B.A. and M.A. (Saskatchewan), Ph.D. (L.S.E.). Areas of specialization: Canadian and provincial government and politics and Canada's role in international environmental affairs. Author of Covenants Without the Sword, several articles and book chapters on Canadian government and politics and international environmental policy, and a soon to be published biography of the Honorable Alvin Hamilton. Member, 1975 CPSA Programme Committee--Canadian Politics; 1986 CPSA Programme Committee--Provincial Politics; and Local Representative--1984 CPSA meetings at Guelph.

GEOFFREY LAMBERT, Associate Professor, Political Studies, University of Manitoba. B.A. (Manchester), M.A., Ph.D. (Minnesota) Specialist in comparative politics (Britain, political parties, elites) and recently in Canadian politics. Has published several articles on comparative and Canadian politics in Canadian and U.S. journals. Regular contributor to Canadian Annual Review. Currently engaged in studies of dissent in Canadian House of Commons, and changing demographics of British Conservative candidate recruitment since 1945. Currently member of Council, SSHRCC, and Chair (1988) of SSHRCC Committee to review Canada Research Fellowships programme. He has served on Manitoba Legislative Internship Selection Committee, and on Manitoba Universities Grants Commission. Member of CPSA, APSA and PSA of UK.

MARGARET LITTLE is a doctoral candidate in the Department of Political Science at York University. She recently completed her comprehensives in the areas of Canadian Politics and Women and Politics and is beginning a thesis on the Canadian Welfare State's economic, social and sexual regulation of women's lives. Before coming to York, she received a Bachelor of Honours in Journalism (with a minor in politics) at the University of King's College, affiliated with Dalhousie University, Halifax, Nova Scotia in 1981. She was a newspaper journalist in Halifax, Calgary and Whitehorse before returning to the hallowed halls of academia to complete a Masters in Political Science at Queen's University in 1985. Since arriving at York University she has been an active participant in numerous university committees.

LESLIE A. PAL, B.A. (Hons., Mount Allison University, 1975); M.A. (Queen's University, 1976); Ph.D. (Queen's University, 1981). Assistant Professor, University of Waterloo, 1980-82; Assistant Professor and Associate Professor, The University of Calgary, 1982 to the present; Visiting Research Fellow, School of Public Administration, Carleton University, 1988-89; Director, Research Unit for Public Policy Studies, The University of Calgary, 1986-88. Books include Public Policy Analysis (Methuen, 1987), State, Class and Bureaucracy (McGill-Queen's University Press, 1988), Prime Ministers and Premiers (edited with David Taras, Prentice-Hall, 1988).

JEREMY T. PALTIEL, Assistant Professor in Political Science at the University of Alberta. Graduated from the University of Toronto with a B.A. in East Asian Studies (1974). Studied in Beijing, China (1974-76) before undertaking graduate studies in Political Science at the University of California, Berkeley (M.A. 1979, Ph.D. 1984). Taught at the University of California, San Diego and at the University of Arizona before coming to Edmonton in 1984. His area of interest is comparative politics, with a special emphasis on comparative communism, and East Asia. His most recent publication is a chapter in The State in Comparative and International Perspective edited by James Caporaso on the political economy of the Chinese economic reform.

DOUGLAS E. WILLIAMS was educated at California State University, Stanford University, the University of Essex, and the University of British Columbia, where he received his Ph.D. He has taught at Vancouver Community College, Capilano Community College, the University of Victoria, Queen's University, and McGill University, where he held a Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada Post-doctoral Fellowship in Political Theory. He currently holds a Canada Research Fellowship at Queen's, where he is completing a book on postwar political theory, The Voices of Political Theory in the Conversations of Our Times. Cairns (McClelland and Stewart, Ltd., 1988), and a number of articles and reviews on the philosophy of the social sciences, the development of political science in Canada, and contemporary political theory and cultural criticism.

Teaching and research interests include Canadian and American unions, the Canadian auto industry and parties and interest groups. This book delves behind the most recent subjects of debate on foreign ownership, including the National Energy Program, FIRA, and the Canada-US free trade deal.

Using a wide-ranging comparative approach, Laxer subjects the standard explanations of Canada's economic dependence to careful and critical scrutiny. He challenges the theories of accepted orthodoxies from conservative to Marxist - including those of George Grant, Donald Creighton, Harold Innis, Hugh Aitken, Wallace Clement, and Leo Panitch - arguing that their assumptions about external control, the role of the Canadian elite, and the effects of geography are not adequate to explain Canada's failure at more independent development.

Persuasively argued, *Open for Business* is a fresh look at the Canadian experience. By challenging accepted perspectives about Canada's past, it offers important insights for the future.

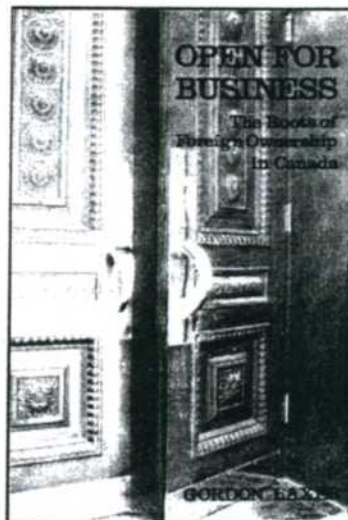

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT /
LE PROJET DE MODIFICATION CONSTITUTIONNELLE

ARTICLE 8.7

MOTION: BOARD OF DIRECTORS

That article 8.7 of the Constitution of the Canadian Political Science Association be amended to read:

The Ballots shall be completed by the voters in accordance with the instructions thereon and delivered to the Official Scrutineer who shall be a former president of the Association, appointed for that purpose by the Board of Directors. The Official Scrutineer shall be assisted in counting the vote by a colleague who is also a member of the Association and the Scrutineer shall report to the President in that latter's capacity as President of the Nominating Committee.

MOTION: BUREAU DE DIRECTION

IN MEMORIAM

DONALD J. H. HIGGINS

Donald Higgins, Professor of Political Science at St. Mary's University, died in Halifax on January 8, 1989, following a prolonged illness. Professor Higgins received his B.A. from Queen's University, his M.A. from Victoria University in New Zealand, and his Ph.D. from Carleton University. He was an authority on urban politics in Canada, having written two books on the subject--Urban Canada: Its Government and Politics (1977), and Local and Urban Politics in Canada (1986)--as well as many articles and papers. Don Higgins participated actively at CPSPA meetings, and he played an important part in organizing and animating the local politics group. He was also active in community organizations in Halifax, viewing participation in the life of his community as an important and natural extension of his scholarly concerns. In addition to his many accomplishments as a scholar, Don Higgins will be remembered by his friends in the Canadian political science community for the support and encouragement that he gave so generously to the work of others.

IN MEMORY OF DONALD HIGGINS

For those of us interested in local politics in Canada, the recent death of Donald Higgins is a great loss. Through his publications but even more so through his organizing and participating in sessions at the Learned's, Don played a central role in maintaining and encouraging interest on question of local government.

A number of people are, and have been, interested in local government in Canada but for many, the interest comes from a primary interest in something else -- people interested in housing policy then relate this to local government, people interested in elections may at some point look at local elections, etc. But with Donald Higgins it was different - he was interested primarily in local government and fascinated by all aspects of the field. He was intrigued by the ways in which the practices of local government reflected our political ideas in Canada but he was also interested in the rules for office-holding, the technicalities of planning legislation, the changing patterns of provincial-municipal relations, etc etc etc. He was a mine of information about local government, both in Canada and around the world.

But more than that, talking with Don always reminded one of why one was interested in local government - he loved the subject so much and talked about it so well. It was fun to discuss local politics with him - the aim was always to share information, and anecdotes, and not to score points or to exclude people from the discussion.

Don was an institution-builder. He was a stalwart supporter of the Local Politics section of the CPSPA meetings and one of the people responsible for starting the tradition of organizing visits to the sites of local politics in whatever city the Learned's were being held. It will be sad to be at the Learned's without him. Donald Higgins will be missed.

LEGISLATIVE INTERNSHIP PROGRAM/ PROGRAMME DE STAGE LÉGISLATIF

The Canadian Political Association is directly involved with The Parliamentary Internship Programme and with The Ontario Legislative Internship Programme. In the other regions, an interesting variety of internships programmes also exist. We hope to be able to report on Québec and Manitoba in the next edition.

LEGISLATIVE INTERNSHIP THE NOVA SCOTIA EXPERIENCE

The Nova Scotia Legislative Internship Program (NSLIP) commenced operation in January 1986 and is now in its fifth year of operation. From 1986 to 1988 the program was only for six months' duration, January to June. However, in 1988 it was extended to ten months, commencing in September.

The birth of the program was not a simple matter. Many members were originally lukewarm to the idea, and if it had not been for the persuasiveness of the speaker, Arthur Donahoe, the program might still be on the drawing board rather than an accomplished fact. The original proposal to have the interns "cross the Floor" midway through the session had to be scrapped as certain members feared that the interns would divulge significant information to their new caucus. To offset any fear of "leaks", the interns take an oath of office which includes a section on secrecy and non-partisanship during their term of office.

For the first three years of operation, the House of Assembly, through its committee on rules and procedures, would only approve the program for a year at a time, thus requiring the academic director to return each year and request that the mandate be renewed. However, in 1988 the legislature agreed to make the program a permanent fixture with its own steering committee, composed of the speaker, a representative from each of the recognized political parties, the legislative counsel, and the academic director. This committee is responsible for selecting the academic director.

Currently the NSLIP is funded by the province through the speaker's budget. However, now that the program has been placed on a permanent basis, steps will be taken to raise funds from the private sector.

There are currently four interns. There are no academic restrictions as to candidature except that the candidates must be recent university graduates. To date, all of the interns have been either political science or history students. At the moment, there is a geographical limitation. Candidates must be graduates of one of the Nova Scotia universities, or a resident of the province who is a graduate of a university outside of the province. Of the sixteen interns to date, eight held degrees from non-Nova Scotia universities. There have been eleven women interns and on two occasions all of the interns have been women.

As the Nova Scotia Legislature's session is shorter than that of some other provinces, the interns' term is divided in half. During the period from September to December they are posted as researchers to one of the departments or agencies of the provincial government. From January to June they serve as researchers for one of the three party caucuses. As there are only fifty-two members in the house, it is more advantageous to appoint interns to a caucus rather than to individual members.

The interns must complete an essay on some aspect of Nova Scotia politics or public administration. These papers are lodged in the legislative library and a number of them have proven to be quite useful contributions to the literature on Nova Scotia politics. The interns visit Ottawa and Toronto annually. They also hold seminars with various persons who have a knowledge of the political and administrative procedures.

Of the twelve interns who have completed the program, six have undertaken further studies in either political science or law, one is in journalism, and two hold research positions. Currently, Acadia's political science master's program grants academic credit for its M.A. students who are selected to participate in NSLIP.

The process for selecting the 1989-1990 interns is now underway. The closing date for applications is April 14, 1989. The selection is made by a panel of academics plus a former intern.

From its rather hesitant beginnings, the Nova Scotia program is now firmly established. It receives overwhelming support from the members as well as from the academic community.

Much of the credit for the success of the program must go to the speaker, Arthur Donahoe, who has continued to take a keen interest in it, as have many other MLAS. The interns as well deserve credit for making the program a success in a province which has a vigorous political culture. Many of the interns have remarked how stimulating and educational the program has been and how they have learned about "The real stuff" of politics which is not to be found in textbooks.

ALBERTA LEGISLATIVE INTERNSHIP PROGRAMS

The Alberta Legislative Internship Program offers four Alberta University graduates a unique opportunity to experience the inside workings of the province's parliament for a ten month period, running September through June of every year.

A Double Objective: Work Experience and Education

Within the atmosphere of The Legislature, the interns benefit from opportunities that combine practical work experience with educational goals. The practical component comes as each intern works within one of the party caucuses for the ten months as a researcher/resource person to each of the caucus members. In preparation for session, the interns often take part in the drafting of bills and motions, and researching of questions for question period. Outside of session, the interns likely find themselves writing press releases and speeches, performing background work for members sitting on various committees, and researching long-term projects that focus on policy creation.

Rather unique to the Alberta program is the fact that the interns act as resource persons for the entire caucus, which promotes a broad occasion for interesting experiences as the interns are able to work

with more than one Member of the Legislative Assembly. Conversely, the MLAs benefit from the competent work provided by the interns, who have, through the years, come to be viewed as valuable assets to the individual caucuses. As the selection of an intern is conditional upon his/her demonstration of a high standard of professional ethics, the Members are further assured confidentiality and discretion in all facets of the responsibilities taken on by the interns.

The educational component of the internship is fulfilled in several ways. First, travel to other parliaments - generally to Ottawa and to other provincial legislatures - and to party conventions as neutral observers assists the interns in developing a broad understanding of the Canadian parliamentary system. Second, one compulsory academic paper, which addresses some issue pertaining to the workings of parliamentary bodies, urges the intern to synthesize and present various insights gained during the term. Third, a two-week orientation session with which the year commences in September offers the interns a unique chance to meet with a variety of legislature, government, and political officials from the province. Form this, the interns gain an overview of the workings of the Assembly and of government; and are also able to make contacts with resource people to assist them in the following months of research.

Criteria for Qualification

Although Alberta interns often hold degrees in Political Science, this by no means discounts the viability of any other degree in the application process. Past interns have come from fields as diverse as History, Sociology, Biology - and indeed, a diversity of background is welcomed.

In the same way, a developed understanding of provincial politics is not a required asset of the applicant. Of more concern to the Selection Committee are: generally good academic performance (the Committee requests letters from two academic references and a university transcript); three letters of reference that look favourable in realistic terms upon the character of the candidate; and enthusiasm and an ability to work with a variety of people. It must be stressed that not one of these factors is more important than

the others, and all are taken into account by the Committee members.

Administration and Financing

While each intern is responsible to the caucus for which he/she works in terms of immediate management concerns, the interns remain under the jurisdiction of the Legislative Assembly Office throughout their term. The Clerk Assistant of the Legislative Assembly and the Parliamentary Counsel act as administrators of the program. The Speaker himself chairs the program's Selection and Advisory Committees, which are comprised of one representative from each caucus and one representative from each of Alberta's three major universities, in addition to the program's administrators.

The program's budget, which provides the interns with a monthly stipend presently set at about \$1600, is determined by the all-party Members' Services Committee of the Legislature. Additional to the intern budget, funds are augmented by sponsorship from Benson & Hedges, Petro-Canada, and Canadian Airlines International, which facilitates limited travel, promotional seminars, and other educational opportunities which may arise during the term.

Historic Perspective

The Alberta program - the oldest provincial program of its kind - has gained much respect since its birth in 1974. Young Albertans who have profited from the program have since pursued lucrative career paths into the worlds of politics, the Legislature itself, the media, the public service, and academia. As such, the program has encouraged the development of a group of prominent young Albertans who are well-versed in the workings of parliamentary government in their province. It is this which is the ultimate goal of the program, and the track record of past interns speaks to the achievement of this goal.

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA LEGISLATIVE INTERNSHIP PROGRAMME

The British Columbia Legislative Internship Programme which began in January, 1976 was inspired by the federal internship programme launched in 1969, and in large measure, by the enthusiasm of the late Walter Young, at that time the chairman of the University of Victoria's Political Science Department.

Much of the administrative detail associated with this programme, which is formally sponsored by and entirely funded by the Provincial Legislature, is handled by the Speaker's Office in Victoria. Elaine Dunbar has been the key Administrative Officer here since 1982. Since its inception the programme has also had an Academic Director drawn from one of the three provincial universities. Walter Young acted in this capacity until 1978, followed by Jeremy Wilson (to 1981), and Ken Carty (to 1986). Neil Swainson is the current Director.

From the outset admission to this programme has been limited to recent graduates of the province's three universities. Initially also, only candidates with a specialization in Political Science were considered, but eligibility was soon broadened to include those with backgrounds in Economics and Sociology, as well as in History. In time the 'net' was extended over all of the Social Sciences. Beginning in 1989, save for a general requirement that candidates have some familiarity with the governing process, all such restrictions have been dropped.

Since 1983 this programme has extended over the first six months of each calendar year. The number of interns has been reduced from ten to eight, each of whom (in 1989) receives a total stipend of \$8,400, classified as a fellowship.

Annually the programme begins with an intensive set of lectures, visits, and meetings - an orientation designed to familiarize the new entries with key members of the party caucuses, legislative staff, cabinet members, senior administrative personnel and the Press Gallery. Individual interns then spend the balance of January and February in a government department of their choice. Here, insofar as time permits, they pursue assignments designed to familiarize them with the current administrative environment and its practices.

From March 1, B.C.'s interns are allocated (by lot) to one of the party caucuses, and work with their (non-cabinet) members. During this four month period, as well, they normally visit the national parliament in Ottawa. Since 1976 on occasion they have also visited the legislatures of Alberta, Ontario, Québec and that of neighbouring Washington State. Reciprocally, interns from some of these other legislatures visit Victoria during the late spring.

Academic seminars have always been an integral part of this programme. Currently, three days are devoted to them, involving in all nine presentations by provincial university faculty. The presentation topics range from constitutional issues to the history, organization and practices of legislative life (in British Columbia and elsewhere), and to the current public policy agenda. These lectures are arranged by the programme's academic director.

Inevitably there are administrative problems which are common to many if not all programmes of this sort. Having to adapt the role of the legislative intern to the existence of greatly expanded caucus research staffs is probably a case in point. On the other hand, some of the challenges can be unique. In British Columbia, for instance, and quite unexpectedly, the legislature did not meet at all during the first half of 1983!

Attention should be directed finally to the fact that some credit toward the requirements for a Master's degree in Political Science may be granted by the province's three universities to those who successfully complete this programme. The departments in question specify what successful completion involves, and require, where credit of this sort is desired, that the appropriate arrangements be made before the internship actually begins.

Polcan: An Electronic Information System for Canadian Political Scientists

An electronic information system for political scientists has been established as a pilot project. The department of political science at York University, with the assistance of York's academic computing centre, has set up the information network, known as *Polcan*. It enables Canadian political scientists to exchange papers for the upcoming annual meetings, send news and messages, and look up the electronic mail addresses of other political scientists.

Polcan is primarily to assist members of the Canadian Political Science Association, but students and members of related disciplines in Canada and other countries are also invited to join.

Polcan was established in response to suggestions which I received pursuant to a column on electronic mail which I wrote for the Bulletin in 1988. To collect additional information, I send a questionnaire to the Heads of all political science departments. Sixty-two percent (28 of 45) responded. The survey indicated that of 441 faculty members in political science departments, 286 (65%) use word processors. Of the 286, 152 (53%) use the "Word Perfect" software package. The rest use other word processors such as Wordstar, Microsoft Word, or Mainframe Work Processing Software. At present, only 15% of the total faculty use electronic mail, but the Heads estimated that 55% would welcome the opportunity to exchange papers via electronic mail.

Keeping this information in mind, we decided to establish *Polcan* as a pilot project. Those who have written their papers with a word processor may "Post" their papers in *Polcan*, and other political scientists may access them in an electronic format. I would encourage as many paper-givers as possible to send electronic copies of their papers to *Polcan* so that we can test the usefulness of this information system.

Subscription to *Polcan* is free. To subscribe, you must have an account on your university's mainframe computer, and that computer must be linked to Bitnet, Netnorth, or Earn. (Most Canadian, U.S. and European university computers are linked to one or more of these networks.)

It is our intention to make *Polcan* as bilingual as possible, although to begin with it is possible that some of the help files will not be available in French. As well, we haven't yet found a way to include the proper accents in electronic text.

There are several ways to subscribe, as described below:

1. Send an electronic mail message to: LISTSERV@YORKVM1, with the following one-line message: SUBSCRIBE POLCAN YOUR-FULL-NAME

"YOUR-FULL-NAME" stands for your own name as you would like it listed in the directory of subscribers -- for example, J.C. Smith, Prof., Susan Smart, etc. (The system picks up your electronic mail address from the mail header or the tag information in the message, so you do not need to specify this information.)

2. If your mainframe computer system is known as "VM", you can simply type the following command:

```

SUBSCRIBE POLCAN YOUR-FULL-NAME
```

3. If your mainframe computer system is known as "VMS", you can simply type following command:

```
SEND LISTSERV@YORKVM1 SUBSCRIBE
POLCAN YOUR-FULL-NAME
```

TO OBTAIN HELP

1. If you are using a VM system, type the following command:

```
TELL LISTSERV @ YORKVM1 HELP
```

2. If you are using a VAX system, type the following command:

```
SEND LISTSERV@YORKVM1 HELP
```

Those who wish to post their papers on the Electronic Mail Bulletin Board, or to receive papers from the Bulletin Board, can obtain instructions through the information system after subscribing. Alternatively, paper-givers may mail me (via Canada Post) a disk copy of their paper, and I will load it into *Polcan* for them.

All papers will be posted in *Polcan* in "ASCII" form, which means that anyone who subscribes to *Polcan* can receive the papers, read them on their terminal screens or print them. When computer files are changed from their original format into "ASCII", some information is usually lost -- for example, centering, bolding, underlining,

of footnotes. The pilot project will allow us to evaluate how serious this problem may be, and to experiment with possible solutions.

Because Word Perfect is the most common word processing package used by political scientists, papers sent to *Polcan* in Word Perfect format will be posted in two forms: 1) as binary files which can be downloaded to a subscriber's mainframe account, and from there to his or her microcomputer where they can be read with Word Perfect software with no loss of information, and 2) as "ASCII" files which can be read by anyone using *Polcan*.

We invite you to subscribe to *Polcan*, whether you are a paper-giver of an interested reader.

Polcan: Un système d'information électronique pour les politologues canadiens

Note: Traduction par André Drainville et François Fortier

Un projet pilote de système d'information électronique pour les politologues a été établi. Le département de science politique de l'Université York, avec la coopération du York Academic Computing Center, a établi le réseau d'information *Polcan*. Ce réseau permet aux politologues canadiens d'avoir accès aux communications, d'échanger messages et nouvelles, tout en pouvant consulter les adresses électroniques d'autres politologues.

Polcan a pour but premier de prêter assistance aux membres de l'Association canadienne de science politique, bien que les étudiants et les membres de disciplines connexes sont invités à participer au programme.

Polcan a été établi en réponse au courrier qui m'est parvenu suite à un article sur la correspondance électronique dans un Bulletin de 1988. Pour me procurer plus d'information, j'ai fait parvenir un questionnaire aux directeurs/trices de tous les départements de science politique au Canada. Soixante-deux pour cent (28 sur 45) ont répondu. Le questionnaire m'a appris que des 441 membres des départements de science politique, 286 (65%) utilisent des systèmes de traitement de texte. De ces 286, 152 (53%) utilisent le programme "Word

Perfect", alors que les autres utilisent les programmes "Wordstar", "Microsoft Word" ou le traitement de texte d'un ordinateur central. Présentement, seulement 15% des répondants utilisent le courrier électronique, mais les directrices/teurs estiment que 55% profiteraient du service d'échange de communications par courrier électronique.

Gardant cette information en tête, nous avons décidé d'établir le projet pilote *Polcan*. Ceux qui ont utilisé un système de traitement de texte pour écrire leur articles peuvent maintenant les afficher dans *Polcan*, ce qui permettra à d'autres politologues d'y avoir accès. J'encourage d'ailleurs les politologues offrant des communications à les envoyer par courrier électronique à *Polcan*, ce qui nous permettra de juger de l'utilité du service.

L'abonnement à *Polcan* est gratuit. Pour s'abonner, les usagers du service doivent avoir un compte à l'ordinateur central de leur université, lequel doit être relié à Bitnet, Netnorth ou Earn (ce qui est le cas de la plupart des universités canadiennes, américaines et européennes).

Notre intention est de faire de *Polcan* un service aussi bilingue que possible. Il est possible que certaines filières d'information ne soient pas disponibles en français. De plus, les textes électroniques ne reproduiront pas les accents.

Il y a plusieurs façons de s'abonner:

1. Envoyer un message électronique à:

avec le message suivant:

SUBSCRIBE POLCAN NOM

Le nom affiche votre propre nom, de la façon dont il sera affiché au registre des abonnés. Par exemple: J.C. Tremblay, Prof. Paule Gagnon, etc. (Le service reconnaît l'adresse électronique de l'entête du message. Vous n'avez pas à préciser cette information).

2. Si le système de l'ordinateur central est connu sous "VMS", vous n'avez qu'à faire la commande:

POLCAN NOM

Pour obtenir de l'information supplémentaire:

1. Si vous utilisez un système VM, faites la commande:

TELL LISTSERV@YORKVM1 HELP

2. Si vous utilisez un système VAX, faites la commande:

SEND LISTSERV@YORKVM1 HELP

Ceux qui veulent poster leurs articles au babillard électronique, ou qui veulent recevoir des articles postes, peuvent obtenir l'information nécessaire après s'être abonné au système. D'autre part, on peut également me faire parvenir la disquette par la poste, et je me chargerai de l'intégrer à *Polcan*.

Tous les articles dans *Polcan* seront affichés dans le format ASCII. Ainsi, tous les abonnés peuvent recevoir les textes et les lire directement à l'écran et/ou les imprimer. Lors du transfert des textes originaux en format ASCII, quelques caractéristiques de la mise en page (les caractères gras, mots soulignés, notes au bas de page par exemple) sont habituellement perdues. Considérant que Word Perfect est le programme de traitement de texte le plus utilisé par les politologues, les articles envoyés à *Polcan* dans le format Word Perfect seront affichés de deux façons: 1) en mode binaires, ce qui permettra aux usagers des ordinateurs centraux se servant de Word Perfect de récupérer les textes sans perte d'information, et 2) en mode ASCII, qui peuvent être lues par tous les usagers de *Polcan*.

Awards

WARTIME DOCUMENTS PUBLISHED BY DEPARTMENT OF EXTERNAL AFFAIRS

Documents on Canadian External Relations, volume 10 (1944-45, Part I) has been published by the Department of Supply and Services, on behalf of the Department of External Affairs.

The documents published in volume 10 deal with many important episodes in the closing years of the war, such as the invasion of Normandy, the international aspects of the conscription crisis of 1944, and the development of policy affecting Japanese Canadians. It is perhaps most interesting, however, for the extensive documentation it offers on the determined effort Canada made to gain a share in shaping the post-war world commensurate with its contribution to the Allied victory. This is a theme which was prominent in the years 1941-43, covered in volume 9 of the series, and which will be even more apparent in the discussion of plans for international organizations in volume 11. Perhaps the most important achievement in this regard recorded in volume 10 was the acceptance of Canada as a member of the Central Committee (that is, the executive body) of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration in 1945. The editor of volume 10 is John F. Hilliker.

Le volume 10 (1944-45, partie I) des Documents relatifs aux relations extérieures du Canada est publié par le ministère des Approvisionnement et des Services pour le compte du ministère des Affaires extérieures.

Les documents publiés dans le volume 10 portent sur plusieurs épisodes importants des dernières années de la guerre, notamment le débarquement en Normandie, les aspects internationaux de la crise de la conscription en 1944, et l'élaboration d'une politique touchant les Canadiens d'origine japonaise. L'un des aspects les plus intéressants qu'offre toutefois cet ouvrage est peut-être l'importante documentation qu'il présente sur l'effort soutenu déployé par le Canada pour pouvoir prendre part à la formation du monde d'après-guerre, proportionnellement à sa contribution à la victoire des Alliés. Il s'agit d'un thème qui occupait une grande place dans les années 1941 à 1943, examinées dans le volume 9 de cette série, et qui apparaîtra de façon encore plus évidente dans l'étude des plans concernant les organisations internationales que traite le volume 11. Cet égard, la réalisation la plus marquante, mentionnée dans le volume 10, fut sans doute l'acceptation du Canada en 1945 au sein du Comité central (c'est à dire l'organe directeur) de l'Administration des Nations Unies pour les secours et la reconstruction.

This is my first opportunity to address you through the Column as Executive Director of SSFC. It is with a great deal of enthusiasm that I undertake the position with the Federation and I hope to develop close contacts with you, and other member Associations during my tenure with the Federation. I invite you to contact me at the Secretariat to discuss any of the issues which could be of concern to the Social Science Research community. Throughout the year I will keep you informed of the activities of the Federation and of various issues of interest to the social science community in Canada. In this column I will offer a brief overview of what has been taking place in Ottawa.

ON THE FEDERAL SCENE:

i) A new government: Canadian elected their new government on November 21. As you all know, the PC came back in with a majority. The Social Science Federation will be busy in the months ahead making contacts with various politicians who will be in a position to influence issues of concern to social scientist across the country. A number of MPs will be back, but many will be serving for the first time and we will be working on your behalf to educate them as to the contribution of social science research in Canada. Should you know any elected MP personally, we would welcome hearing from you.

ii) Issues to watch: The funding of the SSHRC, the second phase of the copyright legislation; science policy in general (which now comes under the aegis of the new Department of Industry, Science and Technology which has defacto replaced the DRIE and the MOSST, although it has not yet gone beyond first reading in the Commons). We also encourage all social scientists to further our cause within the individual ridings. Remember that MPs are often more accessible in their own ridings than on the Hill.

iii) The Networks of Centres of Excellence: As you probably know at this point, over 200 letters of intent (38 of these letters were in the social sciences) were received. The deadline for applications was November 30; 156 applications

were received. They will be adjudicated by a Committee of peers, chaired by Dr. Stuart Smith and consisting of 23 members, on the basis of external appraisals and site visits to be conducted between January and April 1989. We have encouraged social scientists to submit proposals and we hope that they will fare well in this national competition.

NEWS FROM S.S.H.R.C.C.:

i) The Courtney report (Research Grants Program): The SSHRC recently released The Courtney Committee's preliminary report for consultation. The report has been widely distributed and the Council has requested a response by December 16. The SSFC had set up a Task Force to examine the RGP last August and submitted a brief, approved by the SSFC Board of Directors, to the Committee at the beginning of October. Our Task Force will reconvene to prepare a direct response to this preliminary report which recommends that SSHRC adopt a granting system based on the track record of applicants. In our initial brief, we recommended that SSHRC adopt a truly balanced program which would take into consideration both the past performance of applicants and the quality of the proposed research program. A copy of our initial brief is presently available at the SSFC secretariat, and the final brief will be available on December 16.

iii) Focus on Strategic: The SSFC has submitted a brief to the Council in relation with the future orientation of the strategic program. We will continue to monitor the situation and will keep you informed. The SSFC brief was approved by the Board of Directors in late September.

FEDERATION UPDATE

i) Who's Afraid of Liberal Education was the title of a national conference organized by the SSFC in Ottawa in early October. Approximately 200 university professors, administrators, and students gathered to analyze and reflect on the undergraduate curriculum as it now exists. The conference focused on the following issues: 1) the strengths and weaknesses of the undergraduate curriculum; 2) current experiments with forms of curriculum in Canada; 3) various barriers to the implementation of a general education curriculum. While there was no consensus on the dimensions and configurations of the ideal undergraduate liberal arts curriculum, there was a consensus that it is

imperative for universities to demonstrate ingenuity and to allocate the energy and the resources necessary to give students the opportunity to tackle the challenges of their times. The conference proceedings will be published shortly.

ii) The Management of Technology Project: In May 1988, the SSHRC announced that it was awarding some \$270,000 for an experimental program to assist in identifying new research areas of strategic importance to Canada. Five national organizations were awarded \$54,000 to prepare reports on issues of national significance. The groups were to describe the state of the art in research on selected key policy issues, identify networks of researchers, propose future directions, and advise Council on potential new programs in the area of management of technology. In the context of their experimental program, the SSFC has recently submitted its comprehensive report on the management of technology to the Council. The project will be examined by the Council at its January meeting. Should you wish any information on the various reports and on the experimental program in general, you may contact France Landriault at SSFC.

iii) National Lobbying Network: At its last meeting in September, the SSFC Board of Directors approved the establishment of a national lobbying network. The objectives of the network, which will be made up of members from across the country, will be to: 1) ensure more efficiency to the SSFC lobbying activities 2) enhance the visibility of the SSFC on the political level; 3) play the role of a consultative committee (i.e. advise the SSFC on lobby strategies). The Federation is presently in the process of establishing this network which will start off small and grow as the network is fine tuned. Should you have any questions or suggestions concerning this national lobbying network, please contact Marcel Lauzière at the Federation secretariat in Ottawa.

iv) Conference of Journal Editors: The SSFC and the Canadian Federation for the Humanities, through the Programme for the Development of Research Communication, will be organizing a conference of journal editors, to be held in Ottawa on February 17 and 18, 1989. Although the final agenda has not yet been established, there will be discussions on the following: the SSHRC Aid to Learned Journals Programme; the

problems in the promotion and distribution of scholarly Journals; and the process of peer review.

v) **New member association:** The SSFC is pleased to announce that the Canadian Law and Society Association has recently become a constituent member of the Social Science Federation of Canada. The CLSA publishes a journal entitled: The Canadian Journal of Law and Society.

vii) **Annual Report:** The Annual Report of the SSFC for 1987-88 is now available through the Federation secretariat in Ottawa.

A FEDERATION UPDATE:

i) **Women's issues network:** At the last Board of Directors' meeting held in January 1989, it was decided that the SSFC would set up a network responsible for women's issues. The Network, which will be made up of one representative from each member association to be nominated by the individual associations, will advise the SSFC on women's issues, will recommend activities to be undertaken by the SSFC, and will act as an information forum. The Board also resolved to recommend to the upcoming General Assembly meeting in the Fall of 1989, the creation of a new executive position responsible for women's issues. Until this executive position is established, the network, once set up, will report to Dr. Marshall Wm. Conley, vice-president for Science Policy and Research.

ii) **National Lobby Network:** The lobby network of the SSFC which was approved at the Board meeting in September 1988 is in the process of being set up. This network which will consist of social scientists from across the country will work to make politicians aware of the Federation's views on issues related to post-secondary education and research. We are confident that this new initiative will make us more efficient and enhance the visibility of social sciences in Canada. We will keep you informed of the Network's activities throughout the year.

iii) **Annual lobby week:** As

usual, the SSFC will participate in the annual lobby week on Parliament Hill staged by the National Consortium of Scientific and Educational societies. The event was initially planned for the third week of March, but is now scheduled to take place between April 10 and 13. The Federation's government relations officer sits on the steering committee of the Consortium to ensure a strong representation of the social sciences. Should you plan to be in Ottawa on those dates and should you wish to lobby on behalf of the SSFC, please contact Marcel Lauzière as soon as possible at the Secretariat (613) 238-6112.

iv) **Journal editors' meeting:** As announced in our last column, the SSFC, in collaboration with SSHRC and the Canadian Federation for the Humanities, is organizing a two day conference of learned journal editors from across Canada on March 3 and 4. The conference will focus on SSHRC funding of journals, marketing and distribution, and questions of peer review. Any enquiries should be addressed to Dr. Michael Carley by telephoning (613) 234-1269.

v) **50th anniversary of the SSFC:** Just a note to let you know that the Federation will be celebrating its 50th anniversary in 1990 and that we are planning major events for this occasion. We will keep you informed.

WHAT'S HAPPENING IN OTTAWA

i) **Cabinet shuffle:** The SSFC has already begun making new contacts with key politicians who will have an impact on research and post-secondary education. Gerry Weiner, Marcel Masse, Harvey André and William Winegard are a few of the ministers who will be closely monitored in the months ahead. The Federation's representations throughout the year will also focus on the members of the Planning and Priorities Committee and on the new Operations Committee.

ii) **Copyright:** In the summer of 1988, the Government passed Bill C-60 to amend the Copyright legislation. This bill ensures that the rights of our creators are adequately protected. However, the SSFC has been pushing for the second phase of the copyright reform which will deal with the rights of users. The former Minister of Communications had promised that the bill would be tabled in the Fall of 1988, but that was not the case. We have already written to Marcel Masse explaining the need to deal with

rights of users by tabling the second phase as soon as possible.

iii) **Funding of research:** The SSFC will continue to press government for the doubling of SSHRC's base budget throughout 1989, as recommended by the National Advisory Board on Science and Technology. Funding of SSHRC will be one of the major issues during the national lobby week in April. We are attempting to explain to government officials that even though the Prime Minister has said that deficit reduction is a priority, the funding of research cannot be compromised if Canada is to compete internationally. We invite all of you to press for this increase in the Council's budget in the individual ridings where it is often easier to meet MPs. Should you wish to receive a copy of a document explaining our position, please contact Dr. Steen B. Esbensen or Marcel Lauzière at the Secretariat.

S.S.H.R.C.

i) **Courtney (Research Grants Program) and Paquet (Strategics Programs) reports:** These two committees did not present their reports to the Council meeting in late January in Ottawa. However, both Committees expect to be in a position to make final recommendations to the upcoming SSHRC meeting which is to be held on April 6 and 7.

ii) **SSHRC staff:** January 9, Mme Paule Leduc announced the appointment of Dr. Louise Dandurand to the position of Secretary to the Council, effective January 3, 1989. The SSHRC is also in the process of appointing a new Director of Policy and Planning as well as a Director of Strategics Programs. We will keep you informed.

iii) **Secretary of State:** The Canadian Studies Directorate has announced several new initiatives in the program. Should you wish to apply to this program, information and application forms are now available from the Secretary of State, Terrasses de la Chaudière, 15 Eddy ST., Hull, Québec, J8X 4B3.

C'est avec plaisir que je communique avec vous pour la première fois par le biais de cette chronique. Je viens à peine d'être nommé Directeur général de la Fédération canadienne des sciences sociales et je suis plein d'enthousiasme. J'espère, entre autre, maintenir une bonne communication entre la FCSS et les diverses associations qu'elle représente. Je vous invite donc à communiquer avec moi afin de discuter de toute question pouvant intéresser la communauté des sciences sociales. Tout au long de mon mandat je m'efforcerais à vous tenir au courant des activités de la Fédération et des divers dossiers susceptibles d'intéresser vos membres.

SUR LA SCÈNE FÉDÉRALE

i) Un nouveau gouvernement: Les Canadiens et les Canadiennes ont élu un nouveau gouvernement le 21 novembre. Comme vous le savez, les Conservateurs ont rapporté la victoire avec une bonne majorité. Au cours des prochains mois, la Fédération s'efforcera de rencontrer les politiciens et les politiciennes qui seront en mesure d'influencer l'état de la recherche en science sociale au Canada. Un certain nombre de députés seront de retour, mais plusieurs siégeront aux Communes pour la première fois. Il s'agira donc d'instruire les nouveaux députés quant à la contribution de la recherche en science sociale pour la société canadienne.

Nous poursuivrons nos représentations dans les domaines tels: le financement du CRSH; la seconde phase de la révision de la Loi sur le droit d'auteur; la politique scientifique nationale en général (qui tombe maintenant sous l'égide du nouveau ministère de l'Industrie, de la Science et de la Technologie), etc. Nous incitons aussi tous les chercheur-e-s à promouvoir la recherche en science sociale dans les diverses circonscriptions. Il est en effet souvent plus facile de rencontrer les députés dans leurs circonscriptions que sur la Colline parlementaire.

iii) Le Programme des Centres d'Excellence: Comme vous le savez sans doute déjà, plus de 200 lettres d'intention ont été

reçues dans le cadre du nouveau programme (dont 38 sont classées dans le domaine des sciences sociales). A la fin du mois d'octobre toutes les équipes qui avaient soumis une lettre ont reçu des commentaires. La date limite pour le dépôt des demandes avait été fixée au 30 novembre; 156 demandes ont été présentées. Ces dernières seront évaluées par un Comité de pairs présidé par M. Stuart Smith et composé de 23 membres sur la base d'évaluations externes et de visites sur place qui se feront entre le mois de janvier et le mois d'avril 1989. Nous avons encouragé les chercheur-e-s en sciences sociales à présenter des demandes et nous espérons qu'elles seront bien reçues par les évaluateurs.

NOUVELLES DU CONSEIL DE
RECHERCHES EN SCIENCES HUMAINES

I) Rapport Courtney (Programme de subventions de recherche): Le rapport préliminaire préparé par le Comité Courtney est paru récemment. Comme vous le savez, le rapport a été largement distribué pour fins de consultation et le Conseil s'attend à recevoir des réactions de la communauté avant le 16 décembre 1988. Au mois d'août dernier, la FCSS avait mis sur pied un groupe de travail pour étudier la question du Programme de subventions de recherche et nous avons osomis au Conseil un mémoire approuvé par notre Conseil d'administration au tout début du mois d'octobre. Notre groupe de travail s'est remis à l'oeuvre afin de préparer une réponse au rapport préliminaire qui recommande au Conseil d'adopter un système basé sur le rendement antérieur des candidat-e-s. Le mémoire que nous avons présenté au mois d'octobre recommandait au Conseil d'adopter plutôt un système véritablement équilibré, c'est-à-dire qui prendrait en considération à la fois la qualité d'un programme de recherche et le rendement. Vous pouvez obtenir une copie de notre mémoire initial en vous adressant au secrétariat de la Fédération. Le second mémoire qui vise à répondre plus directement au rapport Courtney sera disponible dès le 16 décembre.

ii) Le volet stratégique: La FCSS a soumis au début du mois d'octobre un mémoire sur la question de l'orientation future du Conseil dans le domaine des programmes stratégiques. Nous continuerons à surveiller le dossier de près. Le mémoire qui a été approuvé par notre Conseil d'administration est disponible au secrétariat de la Fédération.

NOUVELLES DE LA FÉDÉRATION

i) Qui a peur de l'éducation libérale? fut le titre d'une conférence nationale organisée par la FCSS à Ottawa au début du mois d'octobre. Environ 200 professeurs, administrateurs et étudiant-e-s se sont réunis afin d'entreprendre une réflexion sur le curriculum de premier cycle sous sa forme actuelle. La conférence a fait le point sur les questions suivantes: 1) les forces et les faiblesses du curriculum de premeir cycle; 2) diverses tentatives de réforme du curriculum; 3) les obstacles que les universitaires doivent affronter pour mettre sur pied un curriculum général. Bien qu'aucun consensus n'a pu être établi en ce qui concerne la définition et la forme d'un curriculum de premier cycle idéal, les participant-e-s n'ont eu aucune difficulté à s'accorder sur la nécessité pour les universités de faire preuve d'ingéniosité afin de fournir aux étudiant-e-s les connaissances et les outils nécessaires pour faire face aux défis de leur époque. Les actes de la conférence seront publiés bientôt.

ii) Le projet de la gestion de la technologie: Au mois de mai 1988, le CRSH annonçait qu'il versait 270 000 \$ à cinq organismes nationaux dans le cadre d'un prgramme pilote qui vise à identifier des nouveaux domaines de recherche d'une importance stratégique pour le Canada. Les récipiendaires des subventions (chaque organisme a reçu 54 000 \$) devaient préparer un rapport sur l'état de la recherche dans le domaine en question, les réseaux de chercheur-e-s dans ce domaine, une évaluation de nouvelles formules de financement et un plan d'action de cinq ans. Dans le cadre de ce programme pilote, la FCSS a récemment présenté au Conseil un rapport exhaustif sur la gestion de la technologie. Le rapport sera étudié par le Conseil au mois de janvier 1989. Si vous désirez obtenir plus de renseignements sur ce programme pilote, veuillez communiquer avec France Landriault au CRSH.

iii) Un réseau national de représentation: Lors de sa dernière réunion, le Conseil d'administration de la FCSS a approuvé l'établissement d'un réseau national de représentation. Les objectifs du réseau sont les suivants: 1) assurer une action plus efficace dans le domaine de la représentation; 2) rehausser la visibilité de la FCSS auprès des décideurs; 3) jouer un rôle consultatif en vue d'améliorer les stratégies de lobbying de la FCSS. Nous sommes présentement en train de mettre sur pied ce réseau. Si vous avez des questions ou des

commentaires concernant cette initiative, n'hésitez pas à communiquer avec Marcel Lauzière au secrétariat de la Fédération à Ottawa.

iv) Conférence des rédacteurs de revues savantes: La FCSS et la FCEH, par le biais du Programme pour le développement de la communication scientifique, sont en train d'organiser une conférence qui réunira les rédacteurs de revues savantes de partout au pays. Elle se tiendra à Ottawa les 17 et 18 février prochains. Bien que l'ordre du jour ne soit pas encore finalisé, les questions suivantes seront discutées: le Programme d'aide aux revues savantes du CRSH; les problèmes auxquels font les rédacteurs dans les domaines de la promotion et de la distribution; le système d'évaluation par les pairs.

v) Une nouvelle association se joint à la FCSS: Il me fait plaisir d'annoncer l'adhésion de l'Association canadienne "droit et société" à la Fédération à titre de membre ordinaire. L'ACDS publie une revue qui s'intitule: La Revue canadienne de droit et société.

vi) Le Consortium national des sociétés scientifiques et pédagogiques: Comme vous le savez sans doute, la FCSS est un membre actif du Consortium national et siègera encore une fois cette année au Comité organisateur de la semaine annuelle de lobby organisée par le Consortium. Chaque année (en janvier ou en février), le Consortium organise un lobby d'une durée d'une semaine qui rassemble des chercheurs-e-s de toutes les disciplines de partout au Canada.

viii) Rapport annuel: Le rapport annuel de la FCSS pour l'année 1987-88 est maintenant disponible au secrétariat de la Fédération à Ottawa.

NOUVELLES DE LA FÉDÉRATION

i) Le réseau des questions féministes: Lors de sa récente réunion au mois de janvier, le Conseil d'administration de la Fédération a décidé de créer un réseau qui sera responsable des questions féministes. Le groupe, qui sera composé d'un(e) représentant(e) de chaque association, sera chargé de

conseiller la FCSS en matière de questions féministes, de recommander des activités à être entreprises par la Fédération et à diffuser de l'information. De surcroît, le Conseil a décidé de recommander à la prochaine Assemblée générale la création d'un nouveau poste au Bureau de direction responsable pour les questions féministes. Entretiens, M. Marshall Conley, vice-président (politique scientifique et recherche) sera responsable de la bonne marche du réseau.

ii) Réseau national de représentation: Nous sommes actuellement en train de mettre sur pied le réseau de représentation qui a été approuvé par le Conseil d'administration au mois de septembre 1988. Le réseau de représentation aura la responsabilité de sensibiliser les politiciens et politiciennes aux questions touchant la recherche et l'enseignement postsecondaire et de faire connaître le point de vue de la Fédération sur certains dossiers clés. Grâce au réseau national nous deviendrons plus efficaces dans le domaine de la représentation et nous rehausserons la visibilité de la FCSS.

iii) Semaine de lobby annuelle: Comme à l'habitude, la FCSS participera très activement à la semaine de lobby sur la Colline parlementaire qui est organisée par le Consortium national des sociétés scientifiques et pédagogiques. Les chercheurs et chercheuses de toutes les disciplines universitaires se rendront dans les bureaux des députés et des ministres entre le 13 et 17 avril. L'agent des relations gouvernementales de la FCSS siège au Comité organisateur de la semaine de lobby afin d'assurer une représentation forte des sciences sociales. Si vous prévoyez être à Ottawa entre le 13 et 17 avril et si vous désirez participer à nos efforts de représentations, veuillez contacter M. Marcel Lauzière au secrétariat de la Fédération le plus tôt possible.

iv) Réunion des rédacteurs de revues savantes: Tel que nous l'avons annoncé dans notre dernière chronique, la FCSS, en collaboration avec le CRSH et la Fédération canadienne des études humaines, organise une réunion des rédacteurs de revues savantes. Veuillez noter que la réunion a été reportée aux 3 et 4 mars. Les participants et participantes traiteront des sujets suivants: le financement des revues par le CRSH; le marketing et la distribution des revues; et certains aspects de l'évaluation par les pairs.

v) Le 50e anniversaire de la FCSS: Un mot pour vous dire que la Fédération célébrera son 50e anniversaire en 1990 et que nous prévoyons organiser des activités spéciales à cette occasion.

SUR LA SCÈNE FÉDÉRALE

i) Le remaniement ministériel: La FCSS a déjà entrepris des démarches pour entrer en contact avec divers ministres qui auront sans doute une influence sur la recherche et l'enseignement postsecondaire. Mes. Gerry Weiner, Marcel Masse, Harvey André et William Winegard entre autres occupent des postes clés. Bien entendu, tout au cours de l'année, la FCSS fera les représentations qui s'imposent auprès de divers autres ministres siégeant au Comité de la planification et des priorités et au nouveau Comité des opérations.

ii) Le droit d'auteur: À l'été 1988, le gouvernement a adopté le projet de loi C-60 en vue d'amender la loi sur le droit d'auteur. La nouvelle législation a comme objet de protéger les droits des créateurs. Cependant, la FCSS a fait de nombreuses représentations auprès du gouvernement pour qu'il dépose la deuxième phase de la réforme du droit d'auteur qui, elle traiter des droits des utilisateurs. L'ancienne ministre des Communications avait promis de déposer la deuxième phase en Chambre à l'automne, mais ce ne fut pas le cas. Nous avons déjà écrit une lettre au nouveau ministre, M. Marcel Masse, afin de l'inciter à déposer le deuxième projet de loi dans les plus brefs délais.

iii) Le financement de la recherche: Au cours de 1989, la Fédération continuera à faire des pressions en vue de convaincre le gouvernement de doubler le budget de base du CRSH tel que recommandé par le Conseil consultatif sur la science et la technologie. Cet accroissement du budget sera un des points principaux du lobby du Consortium au mois d'avril. Bien que le gouvernement actuel ait comme priorité la réduction du déficit, nous voulons faire comprendre aux décideurs qu'il est essentiel d'apporter un appui solide à la recherche. C'est l'avenir du Canada qui est en jeu. Nous invitons tous nos membres à faire ce qu'ils ou elles peuvent pour encourager les députés dans leur circonscription à nous appuyer. Si vous désirez recevoir une copie d'un document qui expose notre position là-dessus, veuillez en faire la demande auprès de M. Steen B. Esbensen ou M. Marcel Lauzière.

C.R.S.H.

i) Les rapports Courtney (programme de subventions de recherche) et Paquet (programmes stratégiques): Les comités Courtney et Paquet n'ont pas fait rapport lors de la réunion du Conseil en janvier. Cependant, les deux comités prévoient faire des recommandations finales à la prochaine réunion du CRSH, les 6 et 7 avril.
