Report of Programme Co-Chairs for CPSA Annual Conference 2025 Isabelle Côté and Matthew I. Mitchell CPSA Annual General Meeting May 28, 2024

We are pleased to submit our report to the CPSA board for the Annual General Meeting. Since our last report in November 2023, we have worked hard to populate our team with section heads (more on this below!). On May 14, 2024, the Federation for the Humanities and Social Sciences announced the location (George Brown College, Toronto) and dates (May 30-June 6, 2025) for next year's Congress. This was a most frustrating process waiting to hear this news as it prevented us from making decisions regarding the program for the 2025 Annual Conference. We thank Silvina Danesi for her persistence in trying to secure information regarding the 2025 conference.

As we noted in our last report, the uncertainty surrounding the location somewhat limited our ability regarding conference planning as we felt the selection of our conference theme, keynotes, etc. may be partly shaped by the destination. Now that we have received this information, we intend to march ahead with our plans to finalize the above logistics over the coming months.

## **Conference Theme**

As we note above, we were somewhat reluctant to commit to an official conference theme before the announcement of the location of the 2025 Conference. This is because we felt that the destination itself may inform our thinking about a theme and our ability to potentially secure commitments from particular keynotes, plenaries, roundtables, etc. With the announcement of George Brown College in Toronto, we are now in the process of firming up the conference theme.

As we stated in our last report, our theme is likely to focus on the 'politics of belonging', a theme that we hope will resonate with conference participants who work on local, national or global politics. This theme should allow scholars to feel at home at the 2025 CPSA Conference, as it clearly connects with a diversity of topics of interest to political scientists including citizenship, conflict, democracy, federalism, immigration, Indigenous politics, International Relations, multiculturalism, etc.

## **Programme Committee**

We are very pleased with the composition of our 2025 Conference team. While we, of course, have yet to select a Local Arrangements Coordinator (LAC) given the recent announcement of the conference location, we have filled all of the sections with superb and diverse committee

members. We are excited to work with our team (see below) and look forward to our first team meeting at the CPSA 2024 annual conference. Note that we will be working with the Federation and George Brown College to secure an LAC as we understand that we are entering unchartered waters here given that there is no political science program at the host institution. We have also held off on selecting a head to serve on the Practitioner section as we felt that it was important to first know the location/dates before seeking out an individual to perform this function.
