Proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the
Canadian Political Science Association

The Executive Council recommends the amendment of the Constitution with respect to Article II (Purposes) and Article IV (Membership). On behalf of the Executive Council, it will be moved that:

A. (PURPOSES)

1. Sentence two of Article II of the Constitution of the Canadian Political Science Association be deleted and the following substituted as sections 2, 3, 4 and 5 of Article II.
 2. Any resolution on a public policy issue shall be declared approved if it carries a two-thirds majority of the regular membership of the Association.
 3. A proposed resolution shall be accepted as having been properly tabled if it is accompanied by the signatures of thirty (30) regular members of the Association.
 4. The Secretary-Treasurer shall submit the resolution in writing to the vote of all regular members of the Association within (30) thirty days.
 5. The Secretary-Treasurer will inform all regular members of the Association of the outcome of the vote within a further thirty (30) days.

B. (MEMBERSHIP)

1. Article IV, Section 1, be deleted completely and replaced with the following:
 - 1(i) Membership in the Association shall be divided into three categories:
 - (a) regular member; any person holding a full-time teaching or research appointment in political science and allied subjects in a Canadian institution of higher learning shall be eligible for regular membership; any person whose participation in the activities of the Association is likely, in the opinion of the Executive Council to be advantageous for the promotion of the objects of the Association shall be eligible for regular membership;
 - (b) student member; any person registered as a full-time student in a university department or institute of political studies shall be eligible for student membership;

(c) associate member; any person holding a teaching or research appointment in political science or an allied subject, in an institution of higher learning abroad, or any person in a foreign land whose participation is likely, in the opinion of the Executive Council, to promote the objects of the Association, shall be eligible for associate membership.

1(ii) The privileges of members:

(a) regular members shall have the right to vote at annual and special business meetings; shall be eligible to hold office on the Executive Council and shall receive the Journal and any communications issued to the membership by the Association;

(b) student members shall elect four representatives to the Executive Council; may attend the annual meeting of the Association without the right to vote except in the case of the election of student representatives to the Executive Council and shall receive the Journal and the communications of the Association;

(c) associate members may attend the annual meetings without the right to vote and shall receive the Journal and the communications of the Association.

2. Article IV, section two be amended by the addition of "for membership in the Association and for the Journal" after the word "fees".

3. Article IV, section three be amended by the addition of "or subscriber" after "member".

4. Article V, section 1(b) be amended by the addition of the following clause: "eight of whom shall be regular members and four of whom shall be student members".

5. Article VI, section 3 be amended by the addition of "regular" before "members" in line one and the following clause should be added to section 3: "nominations for student members of the Executive Council may be made by two such members from among their own members, by submitting a nomination paper signed by themselves and the nominee".

6. Article VI, section 5(a) be amended by the addition of "regular" before "member" and "candidate" and by the addition of the clause "and each student member has the right to vote for as many student candidates as there are places to be filled".

7. Article VI, section 6 be amended by the addition of "regular and student" before "members" and by the addition of "as heretofore provided" at the end of section 6.

8. Article VIII, section 3 be amended by the addition of "regular" before "members" and by the addition of "regular members" before "in attendance".

9. Article XI, section 1 be amended by the addition of "regular, student or associate" before "members".

10. Article XI, section 3 be amended by the addition of "regular" before "members".

C. (EFFECTIVE DATE)

If the above amendments are passed at the annual meeting, it will be moved that these amendments take effect immediately after the adjournment of the annual meeting of 1969.

Propositions d'amendement aux statuts de
l'Association canadienne de science politique

Le Bureau de Direction proposera l'amendement aux statuts de l'Association en ce qui concerne l'Article II (Buts) et l'Article IV (Membres). Au nom du Bureau, on proposera:

A (Buts)

1. D'abroger la deuxième phrase de l'article II de la Constitution de l'Association canadienne de Science politique et de lui substituer les aliénas 2, 3, 4 et 5 de l'article II.

2. Une majorité des deux-tiers des membres réguliers sera requise pour l'approbation de toute proposition de l'Association sur des questions d'intérêt public.

3. Tout projet de résolution devra être signé par trente (30) membres réguliers de l'Association avant d'être soumis à l'Assemblée.

4. Le Secrétaire-Trésorier devra soumettre le texte intégral d'une telle résolution aux votes de tous les membres réguliers dans un délai de trente (30) jours après la présentation de la dite résolution.

5. Le Secrétaire-Trésorier devra informer les membres réguliers de l'Association du résultat des scrutins dans les trente (30) jours qui suivent.

B (Membres)

De remplacer l'Article IV, section 1, par ce qui suit:

1(i) les membres de l'Association seront répartis en trois catégories:

(a) les membres réguliers: toute personne qui se consacre à plein temps à l'enseignement ou à la recherche en science politique ou dans une

discipline connexe dans une institution canadienne d'enseignement supérieur est éligible comme membre régulier; toute personne dont la participation aux activités de l'Association serait, au jugement du Bureau de Direction, avantageuse pour la poursuite des buts de l'Association est éligible comme membre régulier;

(b) les membres étudiants: toute personne inscrite à plein temps comme étudiant dans un département d'une université ou dans un institut d'études politiques est éligible comme membre étudiant;

(c) les membres associés: toute personne qui se consacre à l'enseignement ou à la recherche en science politique ou dans une institution d'enseignement supérieur hors du Canada, ou toute personne d'un pays étranger, dont la participation à l'Association serait, au jugement du Bureau de Direction, avantageuse pour la poursuite des buts de l'Association, est éligible comme membre associé.

1(ii) les priviléges des membres:

- (a) les membres réguliers ont le droit de vote à l'Assemblée annuelle et à toute réunion extraordinaire des membres; sont éligibles au Bureau de Direction, reçoivent la Revue et toutes les communications que l'Association émet à leur intention;
- (b) les membres étudiants élisent quatre représentants au Bureau de Direction; peuvent assister à l'Assemblée annuelle et aux réunions extraordinaires de l'Association mais sous droit de vote excepté pour l'élection des représentants étudiants au Bureau de Direction; reçoivent la Revue et les communications de l'Association;
- (c) les membres associés peuvent assister à l'Assemblée annuelle et aux réunions extraordinaires de l'Association et reçoivent la Revue et les communications de l'Association.

2. D'ajouter à l'Article IV, section 2, "de membre et d'abonnement à la Revue" après le mot "Cotisations".

3. D'ajouter à l'Article IV, section 3, "ou abonne" après le mot "membre".

4. D'ajouter à l'Article V, section 1(b) "soit dont huit membres réguliers et quatre membres étudiants" après les mots "douze autres membres".

5. D'ajouter à l'Article VI, section 3, à la première ligne "réguliers" après "membres" et ajouter à la fin de la section 3: "les nominations pour les représentants étudiants au Bureau de Direction peuvent être faites par deux membres étudiants, ces nominations doivent être faites par écrit et signées par les proposeurs et les candidats.

6. D'ajouter à l'Article VI, section 5(a), "réguliers" après les mots "membres" et "candidats; et compléter la section en ajoutant "et chaque membre étudiant aura le droit de voter pour un nombre de candidats étudiants correspondant aux postes à remplir".

7. D'ajouter à l'Article VI, section 6, "réguliers et étudiants" après le mot "membres", ainsi que "selon ce qui est prévu ci-dessus" à la fin de la section.

8. D'ajouter à l'Article VIII, section 3, "réguliers" après le mot "membres" et "membres réguliers" avant le mot "présents".

9. D'ajouter à l'Article XI, section 1, "réguliers, étudiants ou associés" après le mot "membres".

10. D'ajouter à l'Article XI, section 3, "réguliers" après le mot "membres".

C (Date d'entrée en vigueur)

Si ces amendements sont approuvés par l'Assemblée annuelle, la résolution suivante sera proposé:

"que ces amendments entrent en vigueur immédiatement

F R A I S D E T R A N S P O R T

La CPSA/ACSP a reçu du SSRCC/CCRSS une subvention de transport destinée à permettre aux membres éloignés, d'assister à la séance annuelle de l'Association. Ces fonds sont d'abord mis à la disposition des membres plus jeunes, attendu que le voyage de ceux qui présentent ou discutent une communication, ou qui y président, sera vraisemblablement défrayé par leur propre université. Ceux qui désirent se prévaloir de cette aide devraient tâcher d'obtenir une contribution similaire de leur employeur, ce qui permettrait à CPSA/ACSP de répartir son assistance plus largement. Les demandes de subvention devraient, après avoir précisé le coût du transport aérien (passage simple, classe économique) et déclaré les autres sources de financement escomptées, ainsi que le statut académique du demandeur, être envoyées au secrétaire-trésorier (Professor Robert A. Fenn, Department of Political Economy, University of Toronto, 100 St. George St., Toronto 5) avant le 2 mai 1969 et accompagnées d'une enveloppe affranchie.

T R A V E L C O S T S

The CPSA receives a travel grant from the SSRCC to assist members to come to the annual meeting from distant places. These funds are particularly designed to help younger members on the assumption that those presenting, discussing, or chairing papers will be subsidized by their own University. Those requesting C.P.S.A. grants are urged to obtain finance from their own institutions in order to allow the Travel Fund to be spread widely. Requests, stating the cost of the economy return air fare, the grants you expect to receive from other sources, and the academic rank of the member must reach the Secretary-Treasurer, Professor Robert A. Report of the Secretary-
Treasurer for the Year
ending December 31, 1968

Last year in giving my report I had to note a sombre financial position. Then, we had a deficit on the year's operations of \$212.00, a deficit which necessitated a reconsideration of our financial position vis à vis grants for the Canadian Journal of Political Science and of the basic price for the Journal itself. This year we can report a surplus of \$6,957.00. What has caused the difference in our position?

When the original estimates for the Journal were made, it was assumed, as a conservative but reasonable projection of circulation, that 1900 copies would be a good target at which to aim and on which estimates of costs would be based. Instead, we found that a campaign of publicity for the new Journal caused us to overshoot that point by a considerable margin, in fact, by almost 1000 subscriptions. (See Appendix I to this report where a breakdown of our membership up to December 1968, is given). The surplus is almost entirely accounted for by this fact.

It should be said that a great strain on our finances was relieved by increased grants from the Canada Council for the Journal. In place of the original grant of \$14,000.00 for 1968 we received one of \$26,000.00 for the subsidization of the Journal. This grant of \$26,000. has been renewed for 1969. However, for the first time, the Association itself has been given a subsidy. In September 1968 the Canada Council granted the C.P.S.A. a subsidy of \$6,860.00 for the administrative and other costs of running our Association in 1968-69. This has meant that the full cost of the Executive Council meetings have been met by the C.P.S.A. and that we no longer have to depend on the limited travel funds of universities in order to hold an executive meeting. If this grant can be increased slightly a secretary on a full-time basis with the editors of the Journal. If this can be done, then, we can expand the services and projects of the Association.

We face one serious difficulty in the near future. Recent changes in the postal rates and regulations imply a substantial increase in the mailing costs of our Journal. This may add \$1.00 per year to the cost of the average subscription. However, the full effect of this in cost cannot be fully assessed until the late Fall.

One major task lies unfinished. We have had a commitment to survey the problems of the discipline of political science in Canada for some time. This year a considerable effort was made to find both the people and the money to carry out such a survey. We did not succeed, but various alternatives are being canvassed at the present.

Two major tasks have been substantially completed: the survey by Professor Pross of Canadian provincial government handling of government documents and the scheme of Parliamentary internships. The latter has been made possible by a generous donation by the Donner Canadian Foundation of \$222,000.00 over a four year period. This donation implies that we have sought for and received, the status of a charitable organization from the federal government.

The Fortieth Annual Meeting
of the Canadian Political
Science Association

The meeting convened at 4 p.m. on June 6, 1967 at the University of Calgary with President H.B. Mayo in the chair. The Secretary-Treasurer moved that the agenda be adopted as printed, with the inclusion of an item of the report of the Board of Editors to be included after the Secretary-Treasurer's report. (moved Fenn, seconded Santos, carried). The minutes of the last meeting as printed in the August 1967 issue of the Canadian Journal of Economics and Political Science were adopted as circulated. (moved Fenn, seconded Smiley, carried).

The President in his opening remarks explained to the members his reasons for cancelling the Presidential address this year. He noted that the question of the institution of a scheme of parliamentary assistantship had not been neglected. However, at the request of the speaker of the House of Commons in March, further discussions had been postponed until after the election. It was the intention of the continuing members of the executive to pursue this matter further. He went on to note that the survey on the availability of government documents, particularly those of the provincial levels of government, for members of the discipline, and other related professions, for research, was now being undertaken. With the support of the C.P.S.A., Professor Paul Pross of Dalhousie University received a Canada Council grant to conduct this research. Professor Pross then reported briefly on the state of his research to date, and he informed the members that he hoped to have a preliminary report available by the end of September. Professor Davey felt that the C.P.S.A. should, as soon as possible, advise governments that this type of material must be made easily available, and Professor Mayo added that as soon as the research was completed it was anticipated that action upon the lines suggested could be taken. Professor Pross indicated that so far in his survey, civil servants contacted were in full accord with Professor Davey's suggestion concerning the availability of provincial government documents.

Professor Mayo informed members that in addition to materials submitted by individual members of political science faculties across Canada to the Macdonald committee, the executive of the association had also prepared a brief to be submitted with other associations within the humanities and social sciences. Members of the executive had received a great amount of interesting material relating to political science in Canada, but there was little doubt that there was more to be learned. It was the intention of the executive to institute a survey of the discipline in Canada as soon as possible. Other societies in Canada have carried out similar surveys very successfully, and they have been assisted in this by various fund granting bodies. In relation to this survey, the proposal of Mr. Keer of Laval will receive consideration.

Professor Thorburn, at the request of the President, reported that York University had extended an invitation to the C.P.S.A. to hold their annual meeting at their campus in 1969. This invitation had been accepted with thanks, and full details of dates would be communicated to the membership as soon as possible. Professor Thorburn explained the reasons why it was doubtful in the future that all the learned societies would meet together in one place, although it was quite possible that the social sciences, and possibly some of the humanities, would be together at York.

Professor Mayo closed his remarks by saying that his year in office had been most agreeable to him, particularly in that most of the actual work load had been carried by others. He expressed his thanks to the editor of the Journal, to Professor Paltiel and his committee for the work on the excellent programme and to the Secretary-Treasurer for all his work during the year.

The Secretary-Treasurer reported that the association is now using a new fiscal year, comparable with that of the Journal, and he noted that the accounts for the first eight months are published in the conference programme. These accounts show a deficit of \$843.00. Detailed explanations for the reasons of the increase in expenses over income were given, together with a report on various sources of additional income which had been received for specific projects. (The Secretary-Treasurer's full report follows the minutes).

Professor Davey then made a request that announcements concerning the annual meetings should be published as early as possible in order that members could make all the necessary arrangements to attend the meetings. Professor Naider enquired if it would be possible for the C.P.S.A. to circulate copies of all papers presented at the annual meetings to the membership at least two weeks before the meetings, so that participants could have a chance to study them in advance. Professor Paltiel explained the financial reasons why such a suggestion would not be feasible. Professor Grady suggested that an alternative method might be for a list of papers and authors to be published in advance in the Journal, so that interested members could write to the author for an early copy. This suggestion was taken on advisement for consideration by the next programme chairman, although difficulties were envisaged. Professor Paltiel then raised a question of the choosing of programme chairman in the future. He argued strongly for the idea of choosing of programme chairmen two years in advance, and this proposal was noted. Professor Verney then proposed a vote of thanks be given to Professors Fenn and Paltiel for their work in the preparation of an excellent meeting. This was carried by acclamation. The Secretary-Treasurer's report was then moved by the Secretary-Treasurer, seconded by Professor Laponce

and carried unanimously.

Professor Meisel, on behalf of himself and Professor Bergeron, moved the adoption of the editorial board's report as circulated. Discussion of various related points concerning the objectives of the Journal, and the criteria considered and used by the editors and readers when evaluating manuscripts, followed. Professor Meisel reported that the editorial board had not yet received full information from universities concerning their faculty members, and their possible interests, so that the editorial board could find readers and reviewers in areas where their special competence was required, but he hoped that this would be forthcoming shortly. Mr. Kay suggested an announcement requesting readers for articles should be included in the next issue of the Journal. Professor Black informed the members that it was the policy of the board to seek articles from all areas of interest within the discipline, and unless readers from the same field were found to assist the editors, their task would be virtually impossible. Professor Davey pointed out that if editors in the future failed to produce a Journal that was to the satisfaction of the association they could be replaced. Professor Sabourin expressed the thanks of the association and of the Société canadienne de science Politique to the editors for the tremendous work which had been done. This motion of confidence received the unanimous consent of those present. Professor Meisel's motion of adoption of his report was seconded by Professor Fenn and carried.

The Secretary-Treasurer then moved the adoption of the report of the nominating committee for the executive council. He proposed that each category of offices be taken separately. The President D.V. Smiley, the two Vice-Presidents L. Sabourin and H. Thorburn and the Secretary-Treasurer R.A. Fenn were all elected by acclamation. At the point at which the names of the members at large for two year terms was moved Professor Dawson pointed out that whereas the constitution of the association stipulated that at least one member should be nominated from each of the regions, the Atlantic provinces were not represented in the list of nominations. After discussion, it was agreed that in the future this interpretation of the constitution should be adhered to. It was proposed that in view of the fact that an election would be necessary in this category, as in addition to the proposals of the nominating committee, another nomination had been received, other categories should be considered out of turn. There were no additional nominations from the floor. For the member at large the one year term David Smith was elected by acclamation. For members of the nominating committee F. Schindler, J. Courtney, and J. Trent were elected by acclamation. A further nomination prior to the meeting for the members at large required a vote, results of which were

as follows: G. Davey - 75, G. Lalande - 62, P. Painchaud - 55, K.Z. Paltiel - 63, A. Vachet - 53, D. Verney - 62, and Z. Kay - 28. The first six listed were elected. Professor Qualter acted as a returning officer with the assistance of four graduate students. Thanks were rendered to Professor Qualter and his assistants and Mr. Trent proposed that the ballots be destroyed. This was carried.

After a brief discussion it was proposed by the Secretary-Treasurer "that the membership fee be raised by \$2.00 and each membership category, subject to discussion with the Société canadienne de science Politique." This was seconded by Professor Bochiurkiw and was carried unanimously. Mr. Trent announced that a colloque would be held in conjunction with the Société canadienne de science Politique on November 9 and 10 in Ottawa, and he requested members to make every effort possible to attend this first joint venture of the two societies. It was hoped that some travel funds would be forthcoming from external sources which would assist the participants in the colloque. It was then moved by Professor Courtney and seconded by Professor Meisel "that the President express to the University of Calgary the thanks of the association for their hospitality" and this motion was carried unanimously. At this point Mr. Trent raised the question of the format of future meetings, and he argued that it might be possible to hold more panel discussions and to move away from a rather rigid pattern of past programmes. It was suggested that in the next issue of the Journal after the appointment of the next year's programme chairman, that members might be canvassed for suggestions of topics to be discussed. Also the programme chairman might solicit proposals as to different types of format to be utilized in future on an experimental basis, in the first instance. It was agreed that the next programme chairman, and his committee should take note of the feelings of the meeting. Professor Mayo at this point handed over the chair to the incoming President, Professor D.V. Smiley. Mr. Keer then enquired as to the availability of the study of discipline which the association would be undertaking. Professor Mayo replied that the study would probably be issued in the form of a booklet, but that no definite form had as yet been decided upon. It was doubtful that such a survey would be published in the Journal. The meeting was adjourned at 6:10 p.m.

La quarantième réunion annuelle
de l'Association canadienne de
Science politique

L'assemblée présidée par le professeur H.B. Mayo s'est réunie à 4h p.m., le 6 juin 1968, à l'Université de Calgary. Le secrétaire-trésorier proposa que l'ordre du jour soit adopté tel que proposé et qu'un item du rapport du Conseil de direction de la Revue soit inclus dans le compte rendu final. (proposé par Fenn, appuyé par Santos, adopté). On adopta ensuite le procès de la dernière réunion, tel qu'imprimé dans le numéro du mois d'août 1967 de la Revue canadienne d'Economique et de Science politique. (proposé par Fenn, appuyé par Smiley, adopté).

Monsieur Mayo expliqua d'abord pourquoi le discours annuel du président n'avait pas été prononcé. Il souligna ensuite que l'Association s'intéressait toujours au projet ayant trait aux stagiaires parlementaires. Cependant, à la suite d'une suggestion exprimée au mois de mars par le président de la Chambre des Communes, on avait décidé de continuer les discussions à ce sujet après les élections. Les membres du Bureau de direction ont néanmoins l'intention de s'intéresser davantage à cette question. Le président dit ensuite quelques mots au sujet de la présente enquête sur l'accès aux documents gouvernementaux -- surtout au niveau provincial -- par les politicologues et les autres spécialistes des Sciences sociales. Avec l'aide de l'Association, le professeur Paul Pross de l'Université Dalhousie a obtenu une subvention du Conseil des Arts du Canada pour entreprendre un tel projet. Le professeur Pross exposa brièvement l'état de ses recherches et promit de déposer un rapport préliminaire à la fin de septembre. Le professeur Davey estima que l'Association devait souligner aux gouvernements qu'il était urgent de faciliter l'accès à tous les documents utiles à la conduite des recherches. Le professeur Mayo répondit qu'une décision en ce sens serait prise une fois que l'enquête serait terminée. Selon le professeur Pross, les fonctionnaires qu'il avait déjà interrogés semblaient être très ouverts à une telle suggestion.

Le professeur Mayo informa ensuite l'assemblée qu'en plus des travaux présentés individuellement au Comité Macdonald par certains professeurs des facultés de Science politique à travers le Canada, le Bureau de direction de l'Association, en collaboration avec certaines associations intéressées aux humanités et aux Sciences sociales, avaient préparé un rapport pour ce comité. Les membres du Bureau ont déjà reçu une certaine documentation sur l'état de la Science politique au Canada, mais il y a encore beaucoup de travail à faire. Le Bureau a l'intention d'instituer une enquête sur l'état de la Science politique au Canada; d'autres sociétés canadiennes ont organisé avec succès des enquêtes semblables après avoir reçu des subventions de différents organismes. Les suggestions de monsieur Keer de l'Université Laval au sujet de cette enquête seront étudiées avec soin.

A la demande du président, le professeur Thorburn invita l'Association à tenir la réunion annuelle de 1969 sur le campus de l'Université York. L'Invitation fut acceptée avec plaisir et il fut entendu que les renseignements concernant cette prochaine réunion seraient communiqués aux membres le plus tôt possible. Le professeur Thorburn expliqua ensuite pourquoi les Sociétés savantes ne se réuniraient plus en même temps, au même endroit; il ajouta toutefois que les Sciences sociales et les humanités se réuniraient probablement aux mêmes dates à l'université York.

En terminant, le professeur Mayo souligna que son mandat lui avait été agréable, étant donné que d'autres personnes avaient accepté de partager le fardeau du travail. Il remercia les codirecteurs de la Revue, le secrétaire-trésorier, le professeur Paltiel et les membres de son comité pour le travail accompli durant l'année.

Le secrétaire-trésorier expliqua que l'Association utilisait maintenant une nouvelle année fiscale identique à celle de la Revue. Il ajouta que le bilan des huit premiers mois de l'exercice financier de l'Association était publié dans le programme du congrès. Il expliqua ensuite pourquoi il y avait un déficit de \$843.00, avant de présenter un rapport sur les diverses sources de financement des projets de recherche en cours. (Le rapport final du secrétaire-trésorier est joint au procès-verbal de la réunion).

Le professeur Davey demanda que les renseignements au sujet de la réunion annuelle soient publiés le plus tôt possible afin que les membres de l'Association puissent se libérer pour assister au congrès. Le professeur Naider demanda si l'Association pouvait expédier à tous les membres, deux semaines avant le congrès, le texte de toutes les communications afin qu'on puisse les étudier avant d'assister aux séances de travail. A ce sujet, le professeur Paltiel répondit que l'on n'avait pas les ressources financières pour réaliser un tel projet. Le professeur Grady suggéra, à titre d'alternative, que les titres des communications et les noms des auteurs soient publiés dans la Revue afin que les membres intéressés puissent entrer en communication avec l'auteur et obtenir une copie de son texte. Même si la mise en oeuvre de cette dernière suggestion présente plusieurs problèmes, on proposa que le prochain président du Comité du programme étudie cette possibilité. Le professeur Paltiel souleva ensuite la question du choix du président du Comité du programme; il se dit convaincu que celui-ci devrait être choisi deux années à l'avance. Le professeur Verney proposa un vote de remerciements à l'endroit des professeurs Fenn et Paltiel pour l'excellent travail qu'ils ont accompli dans la préparation du congrès. Cette proposition fut adoptée à l'unanimité. Le secrétaire-trésorier proposa l'adoption de son rapport (proposition

appuyée par le professeur Ropotts et adoptée à l'unanimité).

Le professeur Meisel, en son nom et au nom du professeur Bergeron, proposa l'adoption du rapport du Conseil de direction de la Revue; cette motion fut appuyée par le professeur Fenn et adoptée. Il s'ensuivit une discussion ayant trait aux objectifs de la Revue, aux critères définis par les codirecteurs et les lecteurs dans leur appréciation des manuscrits. Le professeur Meisel fit remarquer que le Conseil de direction de la Revue n'avait pas encore reçu, des diverses universités, les renseignements qu'on avait demandés au sujet des professeurs de Science politique et sur leur désir de collaborer à la préparation de la Revue. Il espère cependant pouvoir trouver les lecteurs et les critiques dans les divers domaines de la Science politique. M. Kay proposa que l'on insère dans le prochain numéro de la Revue un texte à cette fin. Le professeur Black expliqua qu'étant donné que la politique de la Revue était de publier des articles dans tous les domaines liés à la Science politique, les codirecteurs ne pourraient bien accomplir leurs tâches seulement si l'on trouvait des lecteurs pour alléger le fardeau du travail. Selon le professeur Davey, les prochains codirecteurs de la Revue devraient être relevés de leur fonction s'ils n'arrivaient pas à publier une Revue qui réponde aux exigences de l'Association. Au nom de l'Association et au nom de la Société canadienne de Science politique, le professeur Sabourin remercia les codirecteurs pour le travail remarquable qu'ils avaient accompli. Cette motion de confiance fut adoptée à l'unanimité.

Le secrétaire-trésorier proposa ensuite l'adoption du rapport du comité de nomination pour l'élection des membres du Bureau de direction. Il suggéra que l'on procédât séparément pour chaque catégorie de membres. Le président D.V. Smiley, les deux vice-présidents, L. Sabourin et H. Thorburn, le secrétaire-trésorier, R.A. Fenn furent tous élus par acclamation. Au moment où on allait procéder à l'élection des membres du Bureau de direction pour un mandat de deux ans, le professeur Dawson fit remarquer que la région des provinces maritimes n'était pas représentée; selon la constitution, chacune des régions du pays devait avoir au moins un représentant. Il fut donc admis que dorénavant cet article de la constitution devrait être mieux respecté.

Le professeur David Smith fut alors élu pour un mandat d'un an. F. Schindler, J. Courtney et J. Trent furent élus par acclamation. A la suite du vote pour combler les autres postes, les résultats suivants furent compilés par le Professeur Qualter et quatre étudiants aux études supérieures: G. Davey, 75; G. Lalande, 62; P. Painchaud, 55; J.Z. Paltiel, 63; A. Vachet, 53; D. Verney, 62; et Z. Kay, 28. Les six premiers furent déclarés élus. On remercia alors le professeur Qualter et les étudiants. J. Trent proposa que les bulletins de vote soient détruits. Cette proposition fut approuvée.

Après une brève discussion, le secrétaire-trésorier proposa que le coût de la cotisation soit majoré de \$2.00 pour chacune des catégories de membres, sujet à discussion avec la Société canadienne de Science politique. Cette proposition fut appuyée par le professeur Bociurkiw et adoptée à l'unanimité. Monsieur Trent fit part de la tenue d'un colloque à Ottawa, les 9 et 10 novembre, et il invita tous les membres à assister à cette première réunion conjointe de l'Association et de la Société canadienne de Science politique. Il es probable que l'on obtiendra des fonds pour aider certains participants à défrayer leurs frais de déplacement. Le professeur Courtney proposa ensuite que le président transmette les remerciements de l'Association aux autorités de l'Université Calgary pour leur hospitalité. Cette motion fut appuyée par le professeur Meisel. Monsieur Trent souleva ensuite la question de la formule que pourrait prendre les prochaines réunions. Il suggéra que l'on donne plus d'importance à la discussion. On devrait éviter d'avoir un programme défini et rigide. On proposa que le prochain président du Comité du programme tente d'obtenir des membres de l'Association des suggestions ayant trait premièrement aux sujets à discuter et deuxièmement, aux formules que l'on pourrait adopter pour les prochaines réunions. On accepta de tenir compte des propositions des membres à cette fin. Après cette discussion, le professeur Mayo transmit ses pouvoirs au nouveau président, le professeur Smiley. Monsieur Keer demande sous quelle forme seraient publiés les résultats de l'enquête sur l'état de la Science politique au Canada. Le professeur Mayo répondit que les résultats de cette enquête ne seraient probablement pas publiés dans la Revue, mais plutôt sous forme d'une brochure; en fait aucune décision n'avait été prise à ce sujet.

La séance fut levée à 6h10 p.m.

Report of the Secretary-
Treasurer for the year
ending December 31, 1967

For the first time in the history of our Association we are using a new fiscal year, one which matches the subscription year of the Canadian Journal of Political Science and hence one that gives us a greater ability to know the exact costs of our Association. As a result, the figures in this year's financial report are not strictly comparable to the figures in last year's report.

As well, other factors are not comparable. With the division of the Canadian Political Science Association into two parts the accounts for 1967 are of some complexity as many of the CPSA and CEA expenses were joint expenses while some belonged to the individual Associations. Nor can we compare membership figures as we have a new Journal. What must be discussed are certain features of the accounts which reveal the financial state of the new Canadian Political Science Association. For the third straight year we have had a deficit in the running of our affairs. The accounts as of 31 December reveal a deficit of \$843.00 of expense over revenue when the revaluation of assets is taken into consideration.

Furthermore, in 1967 we ran into severe difficulties in collecting the accounts receivable which required us to reconsider their nature and write off \$4,000.00 as bad debt. The reasons for this are complex but basically it seems that the membership lists and office handling of membership invoicing broke down as membership increased and as the duties of the Assistant Secretary-Treasurer increased in the last two years. The result was, that we moved on to a new method of membership subscription fulfillment we discovered over 300 duplicate memberships which were being counted as potential income but were not collectable. As well, delays in invoicing members in 1967 meant that far too many subscriptions were being counted as memberships although in many cases there was no desire to renew.

Last summer, the University of Toronto Press made an offer to the Canadian Economics Association and to our Association to handle subscription collection. We accepted this offer and I believe that there is now greater efficiency in membership handling than there has been in several years. This does not eliminate error but now the errors have to be paid for by the agency not by us.

The financial result of this problem, increased printing costs, and increased Annual Meeting costs is that we emerge as a new Association in 1968 with no assets and in a difficult financial position. For this reason your Secretary-Treasurer proposed a \$3.00 registration fee (to the Executive Council) for the Annual Meeting.

However, measures of financial stringency in the office, increased subscription rates (if passed) and fees on Annual Meetings will not save the CPSA from financial difficulties. The basis difficulties lie in the ever increasing costs of producing a high quality academic journal. As you know, last year the Canada Council agreed to subsidize the C.J.P.S. at the rate of \$14,500.00 a year starting in 1968. In early January your Secretary-Treasurer went over the estimated costs and revenues of the C.J.P.S. and discovered that even this generous subsidy was not enough to prevent an excess of expenses over revenue of approximately \$10,000.00. In early February a further request for \$11,500.00 was submitted to the Canada Council and on April 2 the request was granted.

It is gratifying to note that this subsidy provides money for advertising our new Journal and that we are now well over our original estimates of circulation even before a major advertising campaign begins. Our original estimates were for a circulation of 1,900 some 850 of which were expected to be individual members. We now have a circulation of 2339 some 1084 of which are individual subscribers and some 344 of the 1084 are student members.

This year we were granted \$6,000.00 by the Social Science Research Council of Canada for Travel Grants to the Annual Meetings. This is \$500.00 more than the combined Associations received last year. Despite the size of the grant it was rapidly exhausted and a further \$3,000.00 was applied for and granted in May.

It is a pleasure to note that one substantial project of importance to Canadian political scientists is now under way. Last year the Annual Meeting carried a motion proposed by Professor Qualter on research into the handling of government documents at the provincial government level. This project has now begun under the direction of Professor Paul Pross of Dalhousie University with the full support of the Executive Council of the C.P.S.A. The Canada Council has agreed to finance this and will possibly subsidize the publication of a report, when finished.

The reprinting of the C.J.E.P.S. has been completed and, to date, over 60 complete sets have been sold as well as 2,500 individual volumes out of 6,600 printed. This means that shortly, the C.P.S.A. will be receiving a substantial royalty fee as the costs for reprinting the set have nearly been covered. Revenue from reprints of articles that have appeared in the C.J.E.P.S. and C.J.P.S. will undoubtedly assist the C.P.S.A. in the future --- over the last four months reprint requests have been rising.

One other source of revenue is possible for the C.P.S.A. Recently, it has become apparent that the attitude of the Canada Council towards the financial problems of the various Learned Societies has changed. It is to be hoped that some relief from the pressing financial problems of the C.P.S.A. is to be found there. If this materializes the scope of the operations of your Association can be greatly increased.
